

#### New Business

1. Morgan Thalken offered a motion to create an ad-hoc Continuing Education Committee in order to emulate NALS and host workshops by FEMA, NGS and others. The motion was seconded by Carl C.de Baca. Discussion included the fact that Dana Caccamise, California's NGS Advisor has a travel budget and could potentially come speak to us. # **New Law Going into Effect**

Just a reminder, 8771.6 the new monument rehabilitation law, goes into effect on January 1. If you don't recall the particulars of this new section of the LS Act, it says:

#### 8771.6

In every case where a monument or corner accessory is found with a physical condition that is less than permanent and durable, the licensed land surveyor or registered civil engineer using that monument or corner accessory as control in any survey shall reconstruct or rehabilitate the monument or corner, so that the same shall be left by them in such physical condition that it remains as permanent a monument or corner accessory as is reasonably possible and so that the same may be reasonably expected to be located with facility at all times in the future.

The CLSA Monument Preservation Committee is currently working on a guide to be entitled "Suggestions for Satisfying New Requirements under 8771.6". A draft of this guide is available by contacting the chair of that committee, Mikey Mueller.

If you wouldn't mind some editorial input here, I'd just point out that if you don't have any questions about the intent or extent of this new regulation, then you aren't reading it closely enough. If you accept a monument during a survey you are performing, and that monument is in marginal or bad physical condition, then you are responsible for rehabilitating it, with all that implies. It's a noble piece of law created with nothing but the best of intentions, but we'll see how map checkers, up and down the state interpret the language. It could be weaponized and might end up generating a few arguments between surveyors in the coming year.

This kind of change to the law, created by, or sponsored by the organization that represents us Surveyors, doesn't happen in a vacuum and should have been be debated at the chapter level before being finalized, but in this case it seems to have sailed through to legislation without much mention, at least in our chapter. But now that it is a done deal, perhaps we should make a point of discussing, what it says and what it means, at a chapter meeting. And, we should reach out to the local County Surveyors to see how they intend to deal with it, don't you think?

### A Notice by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration on 10/09/2024

#### AGENCY:

National Geodetic Survey (NGS), National Ocean Service, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Department of Commerce.

ACTION:

Notice of upcoming changes.

#### SUMMARY:

The National Geodetic Survey (NGS) is in the process of modernizing the National Spatial Reference System (NSRS). NGS plans to replace all three North American Datum of 1983 (NAD 83) frames and all vertical datums of the NSRS, including the North American Vertical Datum of 1988 (NAVD 88), with four new terrestrial reference frames and one new geopotential datum to which all geodetic coordinates and derived coordinates within the NSRS will be referenced. NGS is releasing key details of the transition to the new datums in the modernized NSRS to help users and interested parties prepare for the coming change.

DATES:

The modernization of the NSRS is scheduled to occur in 2025 or 2026. NGS intends to release associated tools and services within five years of the modernization.


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## The Rant Zone By S.N. Founde

#### Fighting Occam's razor

Also known as interpretation or as often as not misinterpretation. Occam's razor is the philosophical principal that has come to be understood as "The simplest explanation is the best one". I am certain there are a few of you out there that will have a long convoluted explanation of what William of Ockham really meant. It seems that many interpretations of what seem to be simple statutes require many steps of logic (or illogic?) to arrive at the desired conclusion. A guide, as in a logical proof, where the steps are enumerated to take the reader to the conclusion. In my experience one of steps inevitably states that 2+2=3 or 5 or 6 or 8 or 9-anything but Sue. I once received the "interpretation" (quotes are quite intentional) of a code that was three paragraphs long and involved an elucidation to the intent of the original version of the code dating back over 100 years must mean something contrary to what the current version explicitly states. Something along the lines of and seemingly as simple as "the document must be signed in blue or black ink", and then anything other than black fountain pen is rejected. Here is an excerpt of an actual exchange: Well you see in 1778 when the original statute was written, all they had was black ink in wells with feather quill pens and so it's guite clear that that a fountain pen and black ink is the evolution of the tool that the statute intended. Therefore, my interpretation of the statute is that "blue or black ink" means "black fountain pen".



I suppose I at least should be grateful that I ever receive anything at all since many arguments are simply met with silence (agencies were ghosting long before Gen Z). Some of these interpretations are pretty mundane and don't make much of a difference either way, except for the wasted time to go through the process of discussing and revising whatever the subject of the action was. Some of the interpretations are much less so, costing time and money to everyone involved (except the interpreter of course) for little to no benefit at all (see the ink example and the first one of you to mention smudging gets a special hat).

Question for the room: If there is no statute or code, is something prohibited or allowed? I have seen that one both ways from the same agency. Perhaps we've been using the wrong word and it does not mean what we think it means. I suggest we replace interpretation with rationalization. At least then everyone will understand it's bullshit without any initial misconceptions. Can someone please explain this to me? On second thought, nevermind.

# Free Lot Surveys in Lahaina (!!?)

According to the Island News, October 22,2024 edition, a Lahaina Homeowner Recovery Program has been established, and with the help of a 3 million dollar grant from the Maui Strong Fund of the Hawaii Community Foundation, the recovery program is offering no-cost lot surveys for any Lahaina homeowners who lived in their home before the wildfire devastated the town.

This is significant, (and tremendous!) for a variety of reasons but the one that sticks out for readers of this newsletter is that finally, Surveying has been recognized as a critical part of any rebuilding effort. While FEMA routinely provides money in the wake of disasters, they do not make money available, per se, for Surveying efforts, and no states, Hawaii and California included, have any policies or funds to make such an important gesture to the public.

Maybe this will serve as a wakeup call to NSPS and to our legislators that FEMA, when stepping in to assist with a disaster, should make funds explicitly available for the Surveys that everyone knows need to be completed before rebuilding can begin.
